

Fine Arts Department News

Fine Arts Department

The Arts department continues to inspire the school community with its creative energy and initiatives. February saw the close of the Grade 12 Art and Photo Show at the Pickering Civic Centre, and the successful run of our student film fest at the Landmark Cinema. The second semester then opened with a whole new group of student artists ready to put their creative process to work in all our visual, photo, music, dance and drama classes! Several of the grade 11 and 12 visual arts students had works selected by the board office to be displayed for the mental wellness month in February. Congratulations to Gonzalo, Alicia, Amanda and Sasha for having their paintings selected for exhibit. Special congratulations extends to Alicia Katsanis for winning the board wide competition for her digital painting "Passing". Gonzalo will also be exhibiting two of his paintings in the City of Pickering "Canada 150" youth forum at the Pickering Recreation Centre in May.

Drama

Grade 9 - The grade 9 drama students have been diligently developing their performance skills. They have created tableaux scenes on themes such as "Overcoming Adversity", "Team" and "One person can make a difference". The students are currently researching the conventions of Mime and creating their own clown characters. Grade 10 - The grade 10 drama students have completed units on Tableau and Mime and have learned the basics of facial expression, body language and character creation. They have also begun to explore the origins of theatre through their study of Greek Theatre and mythology.

Grade 11 - Students in grade 11 have two major performances during the course of their semester: The Passion Play and The Children's Theatre Play. The Passion of Jesus was performed on Holy Thursday during two assemblies in the gymnasium. The show was very well received. The next challenge for the grade 11 drama students is their Children's Theatre unit which will culminate in a final play performance for students from our elementary feeder schools in late May, 2017. This is a vibrant group of very talented young people who thoroughly enjoy performance.

Grade 12 - The Sears Drama Festival took place at the Oshawa Little Theatre in February, 2017. The grade 12 entry, "The Divine Killer" was an original play written by Matthew Rossi, a grade 12 student. The play was very well received and the cast won an Award of Merit for Ensemble Performance. Immediately after the Sears Festival, the grade 12 students began work on a one-act play performance unit. The two plays were performed for about 50 St. Mary students in the drama room, on April 3, 2017. Following the one-act play performances, grade 12 students have been studying a variety of acting techniques and working with scripts from Canadian playwrights and modernized Shakespearean works. Sending best wishes to the graduating drama students, several of whom are hoping to continue their study of drama at the post-secondary level.

Visual Arts

Plans are in the works for grade 9 and 10 art students to attend a full day clay workshop in mid May at Harbourfront; students will have completed their introductory work in painting, sketching and print making by this time. Ms. McDavid's Grade 11 and 12 students in Interior Design, Art History and Exploring the Arts will be part of the Arts and Culture trip to Harbourfront and Ontario College of Art and Design on May 4th. The trip will include a performance art installation featuring multi-media performers from Theatre Gargantua, followed in the afternoon by a brief tour of the OCAD grad show.

Arts and Culture SHSM: Experiential Learning May 4

Math as a Cumulative Discipline

Math know-how is cumulative, which means it works much like a stack of building blocks. Not only have we needed a base, but a solid and concrete foundation in order to 'build upon'.

Generally, our first mathematical building blocks are for the foundation as students learn rules for addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. The next building blocks are for the framework of knowledge as students learn formulae and operations.

No matter where you are in your math studies, you can excel if you backtrack far enough to reinforce your foundation. You must fill the gaps with a deep understanding of the basic concepts you encountered at previous grade(s), not just

through memorization, as a means of succeeding in nearly any field.




Vocal Music

Canadian & World Studies & Social Sciences Department News

Grade 9 geography classes made and presented creative physical geography projects. Projects included models, video production, media arts and delicious volcano and earth cakes. Please see a photo sample of one of the great assignments in Mrs. Reeves' geography class.

The grade 10 Civics students completed their Civics Big Ideas projects. The Civics Big Ideas activity ask students to think of a Big Idea about a topic he/she is passionate about and concerns their community, city, province, or even the world. Students then research and prepare a presentation about how their idea could make a positive difference. Civics students will have the opportunity to further their research Big Idea and enhance their presentation skills with our after-school St. Mary CSS TED Ed Club.

The grade 10 Food and Nutrition classes have started the cooking portion of the course. Cinnamon and savory pretzels were baked and tasty and sometimes spicy Sicilian Egg Patties were sautéed in an aromatic garlic and tomato basil

sauce. The students also started a unit on the impact of nutrition and lifestyle choices in maintaining optimum health. Moving forward they will explore the many diverse career options available in the food industry, research rising food costs and apply their knowledge to plan and cook nutritious meals. In May, they will participate in the always popular field trip into Toronto for a food scavenger hunt!!

Our grade ten Canadian history classes completed Unit 1 which includes First World War and the 1920s. Students learned about the extreme living conditions that soldiers experienced in the trenches during World War One, as well as the challenges they faced as a result of dramatically changing technology. Students completed their History Rich Task activities which allowed each one to demonstrate their learning based on their interests and strengths.

Grade ten History students will have an opportunity to hear Holocaust Survivor and business entrepreneur Elly Gotz's talk in May at St. Mary CSS. We are welcoming Elly back, and consider him a part of the St. Mary community after having addressed hundreds of our students over the last five years. We are honored to have him share his story of surviving the Holocaust and his message of forgiveness is powerful. His poignant recollections of life in a concentration camp exemplifies the will of the human spirit, and one of hope. We look forward to Elly's visit, and are grateful for his friendship with St. Mary.

The grade 11 Sociology, Psychology & Anthropology classes have looked at a number of relevant issues including shadeism, taboos, social media and the influence of groups. We are looking forward to a number of wonderful guest speakers on varying topics including local homelessness, mental health, archeology and forensic anthropology. We will also be heading to the zoo for a guided tour to witness the similarities and differences between humans, apes and chimpanzees, linking it back to our physical anthropology unit on primatology.

The grade 11 and 12 law classes at St. Mary have been busy studying constitutional and human rights law. They recently began criminal law which covers riveting topics such as police powers, rights on arrest, crime scene investigation, criminal trials and sentencing. The law classes will also be enjoying a police presentation from the canine unit of Durham Regional Police on April 24th and be visiting the Superior Courts in Toronto in May. They were also fortunate to attend a presentation by Elie Ghannoum and David Goldberg, two Toronto lawyers who shared their experiences and career pathway connections for our students.

St Mary's Law Club is excited about several upcoming events that include their participation in the annual Kelly Cup competition. Students have begun preparation in formulating legal arguments related to the case and in the coming weeks, practicing their roles as lawyers and witnesses. They will be competing against 13 other secondary schools in our region at the Oshawa Courthouse on May 3 and 4, 2017.


Many of the hospital and university summer programs are accepting applications now for their competitive programs. These applications require a lot of work and usually the student will need to attach one or more reference letters.




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News From Guidance

RECENT/UPCOMING EVENTS & IMPORTANT DATES

 April 8th – An evening session providing information for any student interested in the NCAA eligibility process of applying to a U.S. school was held for both parents and students in the cafeteria. Very informative and resourceful!

• April 18th – OSAP Presentation. A workshop for current Grade 11 and 12 post-secondary bound students who plan to apply for financial assistance was held in the library. A sign up list was made available in guidance.

• End of April - Proof of 40 hours of Community Service must be submitted by this date to guidance for students expecting to graduate in June 2017. Students are reminded of the April OUAC/OCAS transmission. Check your application files for accuracy. Report any errors and/or omissions to Guidance immediately.

May 1st – the date by which students must confirm their acceptance to an Ontario college.

• May 9th – University Panel and May 28th – College Panel: Grade 11 students will have the opportunity to attend post-secondary planning workshops. Several liaison officers from Ontario colleges and universities will be at St. Mary to discuss post-secondary options with our students.

• June 2nd – the earliest date by which Ontario universities may require a response to an offer of admission.

GRADUATION

• The potential graduation list has been posted outside guidance since after March Break. Students who are in a position to graduate in June are asked to check this list for accuracy. If a student has not checked this by now, it is essential that they do and report any errors or omissions to guidance by May 1st.

SUMMER SCHOOL INFORMATION

• Registration information will be available in late April or early May for students who were not successful in one or more courses in the first semester. Parents will receive a phone call from their child's individual teachers the last week of June if their child was unsuccessful in their course.

• Students who would like to take a new course can also register for Summer School. They may also have the opportunity to take new courses through eLearning. Information can be obtained through a guidance counsellor.

Extended French Department News

As our second semester approaches its midpoint, I would like to take a moment to provide you with some information pertaining to activities and courses in the Extended French department.

Firstly, this semester, I would like to welcome Mademoiselle Mallen to our department. Mademoiselle Mallen has taught Core French, as well as English at St Mary for many years now. Mademoiselle Mallen is teaching the grade 11 World Religion courses, and the grade 10 French class. I also welcome back Madame Zeenaeme-Hammond who is teaching the grade 9 Religion course this semester.

Our Extended French classes have been keeping busy this year. First I would like to congratulate Mme Zeenaeme-Hammond's Grade 10 Religion a Travers les Arts class. Last semester they entered a contest by The Ontario Catholic School Trustees' Association where they were asked to do research on our school's Saint: Mary. With a few very good video entries, one of our very own made it to the semi-finals in all of Ontario! This Religion class also participated in "ArtEdvantage" where they were able to test their painting skills. The grade 12 class was the first ever to have the grade 12 Religion class in French at St. Mary. Although not mandatory, they had a great class with enthusiasm and an in depth study of God's role in Christian life today. This semester Mademoiselle Mallen's grade 11 World Religion class learned all about la Spiritualité Autochtone, a topic which is very pertinent in our current culture. The class created some magnificently original totem poles to represent themselves. Such great creativity was shown!

The grade 12 French classes are about to embark in a new endeavour at St. Mary. For the first time in St. Mary's history, the students have been given the opportunity to participate in an internationally recognized language exam called the Diplôme d'études en langue française (DELF) offered through Alliance Française de Toronto during the week of May 8th-11th, 2017. The exam provides accredited recognition of French proficiency across four competencies: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Upon successful completion of the exam, students will receive a DELF certificate from the French Ministry of National Education. We are very excited for our graduates to participate in this exam, and I look forward to continuing this tradition in future years at St. Mary! This same group of students will be the first ever to graduate with a French Immersion diploma. After four years of hard work in our programme, it will be exciting, but also sad, to see them walk across that stage on graduation, representing our first ever graduating French Immersion class. I am so proud of them all!
