St. Mary was very busy in February. We had grade level assemblies, course option assemblies, and we celebrated Black History month. On February 15th we had a very successful "taste of the Caribbean" during the lunches. The food was delicious and reasonably priced. We had announcements and displays recognizing achievements and contributions to Canadian society by Black Canadians. Our BHM assembly included student prayer, speeches, poetry and student video. Our special guest performer, Sacha Visagie, entertained us while sharing her struggles and successes as a young woman. Luke Stocking, from Development and Peace, kicked off our Lenten season with a presentation on positive peace built by women. This campaign invites Canadians to learn more about the vital role women play in conflict prevention and peace building.

As we close out our winter sports season we congratulate our junior and senior boys hockey team on a great season. Both teams earned LOSSA silver medals in highly competitive leagues. Our reach team won their local competition and move on to compete for the regional championship.

Our Arts Department opened the semester with the annual Visual Arts and Photography Exhibit, installed throughout the month of February at Pickering Civic Centre. The Senior Media Arts and the Communication Technology students held their annual student Film Fest at Landmark Theatre. The theatre was sold out as guests were treated to short films, commercials and animation. Prior to the Easter break the school community came together in an Easter Liturgy marked by a passion play performed by our grade 11 drama students and accompanied by the singing of our choir: gospel witness statements were read by our retreat leaders.

In March our Eco team celebrated water awareness week by raising awareness of the effects water bottle usage has on our planet. From polluted waterways to garbage build up the committee promoted reusable water bottles as a means of reducing pollution. The team created videos, prayers, homeroom challenge, kahoot and a giant bake sale. Junior Drama

Mlle Mallen has brought the Canadian War Museum to St. Mary. Her grade 10 history class had the opportunity to view real WWI artefacts on loan from the Canadian War Museum. Students were able to view items such as uniforms and personal gear, medical equipment, communications equipment, land transportation models, archival documents and photographs, trench art and newspapers, and toys and models from WWI.

With Mme Zeenaeme's help, we also had the opportunity to send our grade 9 and 10 Extended French students to the CineFranco film festival where they viewed a French film alongside our Core French classes. We will have guest speakers coming this semester to talk about the ISE Exchange programme, as well as summer employment opportunities for our students. Guidance News

RECENT/UPCOMING EVENTS & IMPORTANT DATES

- **End of April** - Proof of 40 hours of Community Service must be submitted by this date to guidance for students expecting to graduate in June 2018. Students are reminded of the April OUAC/OCAS transmission. Check your application files for accuracy. Report any errors and/or omissions to Guidance immediately.
- **May 1st** – the date by which graduating students must confirm their acceptance to an Ontario college. Students must remember to sign into their account on OCAS and officially accept their desired offer!
- **May 1st** – College Panel and May 15th – University Panel: Grade 11 students will have the opportunity to attend post-secondary planning workshops. Several liaison officers from Ontario colleges and universities will be at St. Mary to discuss post-secondary options with our students.
- **June 1st** – the earliest date by which Ontario universities require a response to an offer of admission. Students must remember to sign into their account on OUAC and officially accept their desired offer!

GRADUATION

- The potential graduation list has been posted outside guidance. Students who are in a position to graduate in June are asked to check this list for accuracy. If a student has not checked this list by now, it is essential that they do so and report any errors or omissions to guidance by May 1st.
- Graduating students who have submitted a Graduation Bursary Form will be considered for various in-school awards by our Grad Awards Committee. Forms can be found on our website at stmary.dcdsb.ca.
- Graduation gowns will be available for pick-up after the grad mass and breakfast in June.

SUMMER SCHOOL INFORMATION

- Registration information will be available in mid to late April for students who were not successful in one or more courses in the first semester. Parents will receive a phone call from their child's individual teachers the last week of June if their child was unsuccessful in their courses for second semester.
- Students who would like to take a new course can also register for Summer School. They may also have the opportunity to take new courses through eLearning. Information can be obtained through a guidance counsellor.

OTHER SUMMER OPPORTUNITIES

- Students from all grade levels are invited to investigate enrichment opportunities offered during the summer and throughout the school year. These include taking credit courses in Canada or internationally. As well, there are many programs offered at universities for the academically strong high school students.

Instrumental Music

The Instrumental Music Department, like always is very busy this semester. On April 19th, 53 students in grades 10-12 will be travelling to Whistler, British Columbia to compete at the Con Brio Music Festival. This incredibly exciting three-day festival, which takes over Whistler Village along with 1200 other fine musicians from across Canada and the United States will see our students compete as a band and also be combined into a massed band. They will be participating in clinics with professional musicians on their own instrument, and on the final day of the festival, perform together under the direction of some world acclaimed conductors. We will finish up the trip with some sightseeing in Vancouver before returning home on April 24th. Our Spring Band Concert, "Something Sweet" will be held on Thursday, May 10th at 7pm in the café featuring all four of the bands. As always, this culminating evening of music is the peak of our semester, but this year it is also a preview of our performance at Nationals. Tickets will be available starting Monday, April 30th from Ms. Clarridge and Ms. Puccia at a cost of \$5 each. On Monday May 14th, both our Intermediate and Senior Bands will be competing against approximately 125 of the best bands in the country at MusicFest Canada. This year's festival is being held at the University of Toronto faculty of music and is open to the public to attend the performances. The Intermediate Band will perform at 2pm and the Senior Band at 7pm. We hope that many of you come to cheer on the students.

Canadian & World Studies & Social Sciences Department News

Grade nine geography classes have been exploring their mapping skills and demonstrated these skills through a theme park mapping assignment. Not only are the placement of theme park rides and attractions important but also allow student's creativity and visions of spatial design to come alive through their assignment.

The grade ten food classes have just finished creating 3D cookie cutters. They will use their designs to shape their cookies and then finish their creations by painting or decorating their final products. All level food classes have just finished their first unit on sanitation, safety, measuring, kitchen prep. and are excited to start cooking in the kitchens.

The grade ten Civics students are working hard on their Civics Big Ideas presentations. The Civics Big Ideas activity ask students to think of a Big Idea that focuses on a topic he/she is passionate about. Students then research and prepare a presentation about how their idea could make a difference to another person, their community or even the world. Civics students will have the opportunity to further their research Big Idea and enhance their presentation skills with our after-school St. Mary CSS TED Ed Club.


Our grade ten Canadian history classes learned about what our soldiers faced during the First World War. Students learned about the extreme living conditions that soldiers experienced in the trenches, as well as the challenges that they faced as a result of dramatically changing technology. Students will be examining and demonstrating their talents learning about the 1920s and 1930s. Grade ten History students will have an opportunity to hear Holocaust Survivor and business entrepreneur Elly Gotz on Tuesday, May 22nd, Period 1, in the cafeteria. We are welcoming Elly back, and consider him a part of the St. Mary community after having addressed hundreds of our students over the last six years. We are honored to have him share his story of surviving the Holocaust and his message of forgiveness is powerful. His poignant recollections of life in a concentration camp exemplifies the will of the human spirit, and one of hope. When Elly addresses our students, he will have more new experiences, as he does every term! We sincerely look forward to Elly's visit, and are grateful for his friendship with St. Mary.

Students in my Grade 11 Anthropology, Sociology, Psychology course will partake in a guided tour at the Toronto Zoo to explore the field of Primatology. Guest speakers from The Covenant House recently came in to discuss Human Trafficking and enlighten us preventative measures students should take within our community.

The law classes at St. Mary have been busy studying the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. We have looked at some fascinating cases and are visiting the Superior Courts to watch the law in action on April 16 and 17th, 2018. Furthermore, St Mary's Law Club is excited about several upcoming events that include their participation in the annual Kelly Cup competition. In April, students will also be preparing for their crime scene enactments where they stage and investigate crime scenes to gather evidence and determine who is at fault. Opportunities to explore career pathways with a variety of guest speakers from legal backgrounds are also upcoming including a representative from the Canadian Red Cross, law enforcement from the DRPS, a probation and parole officer, and a criminal lawyer.

The department of Canada and World Studies/Social Sciences look forward to the second half of semester two. We wish continued blessings to our students and their families in the St. Mary community.






Math as a Cumulative Discipline

Math know-how is cumulative, which means it works much like a stack of building blocks. Not only do we need a base, but a solid and concrete foundation in order to 'build upon'.

Generally, our first mathematical build blocks are for the foundation as students learn rules for addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. The next building blocks are for the framework of knowledge as students learn formulae and operations.

No matter where you are in your math studies, you can excel if you backtrack far enough to reinforce your foundation. You must fill the gaps with a deep understanding of the basic concepts you encountered at previous grade(s), not just through memorization, as a means to succeed in nearly any field.
