Assignment #1: Analysis of Waubgeshig Rice's Moon of the Crusted Snow (40 Marks)

Instructions: Read and take notes on the entire novel. After you have read the novel you are to choose a section from the list below and answer the accompanying questions. Your responses should be in full sentences and provide specific evidence (quotations and paraphrasing) from the text to justify your answers. Please properly cite all your work (MLA format). Your assignment will be evaluated according to the accompanying rubric.

Tasks:

- 1. Briefly summarize your section.
- 2. What is the author's message in this fiction? How does this chapter/section illustrate/develop/support this message?
- 3. Identify two quotations that describe a crucial conflict in your section of the novel. Explain what the quotation reveals about the internal or external conflicts that the protagonist experiences and describe the significance of this conflict.
- 4. Identify a recurring symbol used in the novel. Write the quote, page number, and explain how the symbol in your section enhances the meaning of the novel as a whole.
- 5. What is the atmosphere of this chapter/section? Provide specific examples from the text that illustrate how the physical setting affects the story's mood.
- 6. Point to a particular, prominent passages, lines, phrases and words in the chapter and explain how such language contributes to substance of the text and its appeals.
- 7. What else do you find interesting in this chapter/section?

Assignment #2: From the Ashes Literary Essay (40 Marks)

Instructions: In a 500 word literary essay (thesis, introductory paragraph, body paragraphs, concluding paragraph, as well as transitions), respond to <u>one</u> of the following essay prompts:

1. In many works of literature, past events can affect, positively or negatively, the present actions, attitudes, or values of a character. Explain how Thistle uses his memoir to contend with the past, either personal or societal.

2. In many works of literature, characters who have been away from home return and find that they no longer have the same feelings about home as they once did. How does Thistle's return to his or her "home" contributes to an interpretation of the work as a whole?
