The Advanced Placement Program

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What is AP?

- The Advanced Placement program allows motivated high school students to prepare for and write university level exams while still in secondary school.
- Teachers prepare students for the exam while delivering the Ontario curriculum; in most cases, the Ontario curriculum covers about 80% of the material. Students' OSR marks reflect Ontario assessment and evaluation standards.
- Exams, which are approximately 50% multiple choice, 50% free response, are written in the students' home school in May. For Studio Art, students submit a portfolio (4 pieces of original art and digital copies of the rest).
- AP grades are: 5 = extremely well qualified 4 = well qualified 3 = qualified 2 = possibly qualified 1 = no recommendation
- Marks of 4 or 5 can mean transfer credit and/or advanced placement at Canadian universities.
- In 2014 students in over 140 countries wrote 4.2 million AP exams. In Canada, 26,500 exams were written; in Ontario there are over 300 AP/Pre-AP schools.

What is Pre-AP?

- Pre-AP is a clearly articulated sequence of courses that enrich students and prepare them for the rigour of AP courses.
- Pre-AP teachers help students acquire the skills, concepts and habits of mind necessary for success on AP Exams.
- Emphasis is on inquiry-based learning, problem-solving techniques and other learning strategies that students need for success in AP and beyond.

Why take AP's?

- enrichment & academic challenge.
- opportunity to enhance individual strengths.

- an emphasis on 21st century skills.
- an enriched learning experience in a class of like-minded students.
- experience in university level exams, projects, writing style to be a step ahead at university.
- university credit and/or placement thus increasing options & possibility of pursuing a double major.
- a way to stand out in admissions process for special programs and international universities.

- a question asker.
- a self-starter /an independent learner.
- passionate about learning.
- well-organized.
- self-disciplined and has good time management skills.
- willing to take risks.
- committed to his/her ideals.
- energetic and involved in many aspects of school life.
